"In the cross of Christ I glory"

"There is not a square inch in the whole domain of our human existence over which Christ, who is Sovereign over all, does not cry, 'Mine!" Thus proclaimed Abraham Kuyper, Prime Minister of the Netherlands, 1901– 1905. (Imagine one of our top politicians saying that!) What can it mean to use the word, "mine", when we are talking about our relationship to Jesus?

Is it presumptuous to call Jesus 'mine', or does He welcome the closeness which that implies? At any rate, we often sing that it is so – "*Blessed assurance, Jesus is mine"* – "*My Jesus, my Saviour"* – "*My Jesus, I love Thee, I know Thou art mine"*.

Then there is the relationship in the reverse direction, no presumption here, just perhaps failure fully to believe it on our part. Jesus says, to all His followers (and that's me, and that's you) 'You are mine – loved, treasured, yearned over....' He prayed to His Father for "*those You have given me, for they are yours. All I have is yours, and all You have is mine.*" [John 17. 9, 10] What is it that makes us His? Well, we are His because He made us, and because He provides for our very existence. But supremely because He paid a price for us, He bought us, He redeemed us: "You are not your own; you were bought at a price." [1 Cor 6. 19, 20] And that, of course was at Calvary, on the Cross; it's what Good Friday is all about.

So that sense of belonging, of possessing even, that sense of "mine", works in both directions at the same time: "*I know my sheep (they are mine) and my sheep know me (they can call me 'mine')."* [John 10. 14] It's the Cross that has done this amazing thing: "*Tis done, the great transaction's done; I am my Lord's and He is mine."*

Yet there is more, for as Kuyper stated, when Jesus claims "mine", it is over the whole of human existence – it is not just over individuals like you and me, it is global, universal, cosmic. And all that too is because of the Cross. In his book, The Day the Revolution Began, Tom Wright takes 400 odd pages to spell out how the Cross is God's pivotal, powerful, purposeful act in history. He writes of "the creator God overthrowing on the cross the powers that had kept the nations captive. Up to now the nations had been enslaved; the cross had opened the gates to freedom"......"something has happened within the actual world of space, time and matter, as a results of which everything is different. By six o'clock on the Friday evening Jesus died, something had changed, and changed radically. Heaven and earth were brought together, creating the cosmic 'new temple': God was reconciling the world to Himself in the Messiah."

In God's upside-down Kingdom, shame (on the cross) becomes glory, weakness (on the cross) becomes power, folly (on the cross) becomes ultimate wisdom. "For the message of the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God." [1 Cor 1. 18]
